

KIDS PLUS Youth In Philanthropy Board awards five grants totaling \$4,558 to children- and youth-led projects in the region

The Northland Foundation's KIDS PLUS Youth In Philanthropy Board awarded five grants totaling \$4,558 during their October 2019 board meeting. Youth In Philanthropy grants are made by youth to support children- and youth-driven projects in the region.

This year's <u>board</u> includes 16 high school students from Cloquet, Duluth, Ely, Hibbing, McGregor, Moose Lake, Superior, and Two Harbors. Five adult volunteers serve as mentors to the board: Jamie Adams, Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa; Brad Flynn, ALLETE; Cheryl Meld, McGregor KIDS PLUS; Tim Stratioti, Boys & Girls Club of Superior; and Dan Thewis, Two Harbors High School.
